- Scholarship to enroll in the DBSA Peer Specialist Course
- 2-year part-time paid apprenticeship to qualify for the Illinois Certified Recovery Support Specialist (CRSS) credential

#### **CRSS Credential Requirements**

In addition to completing an approved peer specialist course, individuals wishing to take the CRSS exam must complete 2,000 supervised hours working in the areas of advocacy, professional responsibility, mentoring, and recovery support.

### **Year One Program**

#### **DBSA Peer Specialist Course**

Enrolled in 76-hour course that provides skills in appropriate use of lived experience to provide hope and inspiration to another peer.

#### **Supervised Apprentice Program**

- Form and lead a peer council in the Black community to understand the peer support needs of the community.
- Form and facilitate DBSA support group meeting for the Black community.
- Mentor peers and provide one-on-one peer support.
- Provide mental health workshops in the Black community.
- Professional development.

### **Year Two Program**

Placement at a Cook County behavioral health center provides supervised, hands-on experience.
